

Consultation on the proposed establishment of a Special Educational Needs & Disabilities (SEND) unit at Holland Junior School for pupils with Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD)

Introduction

Surrey County Council's vision is for children with Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities to achieve independence and employment, whenever possible, in or near their local community so that they can live fulfilled lives and be active contributors to Surrey's future. Surrey has high aspirations for children and young people with SEND. This will be achieved through improved joint working between education, health and social care services to include our children, young people and their parents and carers.

Surrey County Council have a number of mainstream schools with SEN Units for primary pupils, however this is insufficient for the number of pupils requiring this support leading to pupils either being sent to out of borough provision which is problematic for families and costly for the authority, or being sent to mainstream schools which are unsuitable to meet the needs of these children.

Rationale for the Holland Junior School SEND Unit

There is insufficient specialist provision for pupils in Surrey, and additional units are needed to ensure that children with ASD can access the support they need to achieve their academic potential. Holland Junior School already has the capacity to house this provision.

The proposal

The Pioneer Academy is proposing to establish a specialist provision at Holland Junior School for 10 pupils with ASD to be implemented by September 2024, if approved.

The Pioneer Academy is a well-established Multi-Academy Trust with a proven track record of supporting a similar SEND provision at three of its other sites. Holland Junior School is considered by the Local Authority as the most appropriate location for a SEND unit to be sited.

The SEND unit at Holland Junior School will meet the needs of pupils with an EHCP with an ASD diagnosis which are not severe enough to require a place at a special school but who will require spending significant proportions of their time in the SEND unit. The proposed SEND unit will enable these pupils to have their additional needs met while accessing education at a primary school through a flexible approach tailored and adapted to their needs.

The establishment of a SEND unit at Holland Junior School will build on the broad and balanced education already being delivered at this school and will further enhance the education offer the school provides to the community. They have developed good working relationships with the Local Authority's SEND team and we are confident that this relationship will grow to support a wider range of children with ASD.

The new facility will enable children with ASD to have their needs met through a flexible approach, tailored and adapted to the needs of each individual child. It will be for children who will require specialist support to enable them to access a mainstream primary curriculum. It is proposed that the children will split their time between the

mainstream school and having bespoke support within the Unit. The SEND Unit will be staffed by a team of teachers and support staff with knowledge and experience of working with young people with ASD, led by a qualified SENDCo. The purpose of the unit will be to support these children to achieve their academic potential and also to explore ways to develop skills to enable them to access the next stage of their education.

What will be the impact of the new facility on other pupils in the school?

It is not envisaged that the new unit will impact negatively on other pupils in the school. The impact is expected to have a positive effect in that having pupils with ASD in the school will provide opportunities for other pupils to see these pupils as valuable members of the school community and society as a whole. Opportunities can be provided for pupils to understand, learn and contribute to the support for pupils who have ASD.

Admission and Pupil Numbers

Admissions to the SEND unit will follow a different procedure from that operating for the rest of the school. Admissions into the SEND unit will be through the Surrey SEND EHC panel process. This will not impact on pupils who are in the mainstream setting at the school. Pupils attending the SEND unit would be in addition to the mainstream Planned Admission Number (PAN) of 60. There would be 12 planned places in the SEND unit.

Funding

SEND units in Surrey will be normally funded in accordance with a Place Led Funding approach that complies with the Government's SEND Funding Reforms which came into effect in April 2018. For each place in the SEND unit, Holland Junior School will receive £17,518 which is made up of £10,000 place funding and £7,518 top-up funding.

What happens next?

The consultation is an opportunity for interested parties and stakeholders to express views and ask questions on the principle of establishing the SEND Unit for ASD needs at Holland Junior School during the consultation period.

The consultation period starts on Monday 17th June 2024 and will close on Friday 5th July 2024.

Holland Junior School is part of The Pioneer Academy, so will have to follow the process for making significant changes to an academy; as the local authority is not the decision maker for academy organisational changes. The final decision as to whether this proposal is approved for implementation will be made by the Regional Advisory Board on behalf of the Department for Education.
